Vavilov, the genius, would die of hunger in a Stalinist prison, Lyssenko the pseudo inventor, ended up as president of the academy of sciences...

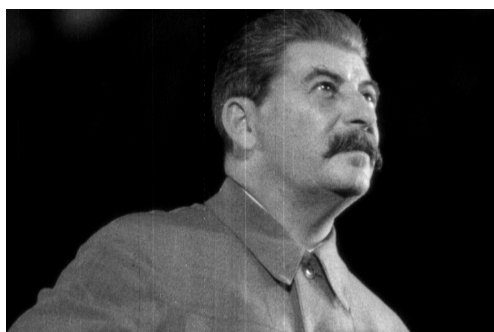
